**BLOOD MONEY**

*"I have sinned by betraying innocent blood"* (Matthew 27:4).

That Jesus allowed Himself to be bound and taken from Gethsemane shocked Judas. Anxiously he waited for the Master to free Himself, but as hour after hour went by, and Jesus submitted to all the abuse heaped upon Him, a terrible fear came to the traitor that he had sold his Master to His death. As he stared in horror about him in the judgment hall, Judas felt that he had started a tragic chain of events that nothing could stop.

Suddenly a hoarse voice rang through the hall, sending a thrill of terror to all hearts: He is innocent; spare Him, O Caiaphas! The tall form of Judas was now seen pressing through the startled throng. His face was pale and haggard, and great drops of sweat stood on his forehead. Rushing to the throne of judgment, he threw down before the high priest the pieces of silver that had been the price of his Lord's betrayal. Eagerly grasping the robe of Caiaphas, he implored him to release Jesus, declaring that He had done nothing worthy of death. Caiaphas angrily shook him off, but was confused and knew not what to say. The treachery of the priests was revealed. It was evident that they had bribed the disciple to betray his Master. Their bribe had directly violated the laws of Moses (Exodus 23:8).

Anguish overwhelmed Judas. "I have sinned by betraying innocent blood," he cried. The high priest, recovering his composure, scornfully answered, "What is that to us? You see to it!" Throwing himself at the feet of Jesus, Judas acknowledged before all that Christ was the Son of God. He pleaded with Christ to spare Himself. Jesus neither reproached nor condemned Judas. Instead, looking at him with compassion, He said, "For this hour came I into the world." A murmur of surprise ran through the assembly. With amazement they beheld the forbearance of Christ toward His betrayer. Again there swept over them the conviction that this Man was more than mortal...Judas saw that his entreaties were in vain, and he rushed from the hall. He felt that he could not live to see Jesus crucified, and in despair, he went out and hanged himself.

## LIVING IN THE HOLY SPIRIT'S POWER

One of the greatest challenges facing Christians is not necessarily what they believe, but how they live. Beliefs are important, because what we believe shapes our understanding of life and leads to changes in our lifestyle. Biblical truths, rightly understood, change our lives through the power of the Holy Spirit. If our beliefs make little difference in how we live, we have misunderstood their purpose. In this month's lesson we will discover how the Holy Spirit empowers us to live godly lives by applying the truths we believe to our daily lives.

**1. Compare Isaiah 42:1-4 and Matthew 12:18-21. Describe the impact of the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' life and ministry.**

Jesus was conceived of the Holy Spirit (Luke 1:35), ministered in the power of the Spirit (Luke 4:14), and faced the temptations of Satan in the wilderness in the strength of the Spirit (Matthew 4:1). Jesus lived a Spirit-filled life and invites us to do the same.

**2. What effect does the Holy Spirit have on our daily lives? Read Romans 8:11-14.**

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
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


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A careful reading of these verses reveals that the Holy Spirit does three very practical things for each believer. First, the Spirit gives us spiritual life (verse 11). Second, the Holy Spirit enables us to triumph over the inclinations and desires of the flesh (verse 13). Third, the Holy Spirit leads us to the reality that even while living in this world we are children of God (verse 14).

**3. Read Ephesians 3:14-21. What was Paul's great longing for the believers in Ephesus? What role did he see the Holy Spirit playing in their lives?**




Evidently some Christians in Galatia were attempting to live their Christian lives in their own strength rather than in the power of the Holy Spirit. Any attempt to face the temptations of the evil one in our own strength is doomed to failure. Battling evil in the Holy Spirit's power ensures victory.

**5. What do the following Bible writers tell us about the ministry of the Holy Spirit in the life of each believer? Read James 4:5; I Peter 3:18; I John 3:24.**



**6. What did Jesus say is one of the functions of the Holy Spirit? Read John 14:17; 16:13.**

The Holy Spirit leads us to understand the truth about Jesus and His Word. The Spirit guides us into an understanding of the Bible and the truths it contains. The Spirit works within us to live in harmony with those eternal truths. We can praise God that His Spirit not only guides us into all truth, but it strengthens us so we can apply these truths to our lives. Our hearts can rejoice that the One who reveals truth changes our lives through the truth He reveals, so we can represent His love before our friends and neighbors. It is one thing to know truth; it is quite another to have our hearts broken by the Holy Spirit and our lives transformed through His power to live in us. Invite the Holy Spirit into your life today. Ask Him to strengthen you to live the truth you believe. ■

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## GOD CARES: *The Message of Daniel*

### Daniel 4: The Message of Daniel Part 2

#### God's Respect for Leadership

In Daniel 4:17, the heavenly “watchers” tell us that God wants the “living” — that is, everybody — to learn (1) that God “rules the kingdom of men” and (2) that He “gives it to whom He will.”

Almost everybody criticizes leaders these days. Is it really possible that *God* is the One who puts our leaders into public office?

Well, it is not quite as simple as that! In our study of Daniel 1, we saw how *very reluctantly* God “gave up” the stubborn kingdom of Judah to the leadership of King Nebuchadnezzar. His first choice for Judah was a far happier one. It was the sinfulness of the people that led to God’s decision. As the maxim says, “People get the leaders they deserve.”

In this account, we see God as the ultimate ruler of every nation, reserving the right to give authority to this or that person and to take it away. It is comforting to realize that God can remove leaders whenever He deems it best. Nebuchadnezzar was king of the greatest nation on earth in his day, but in an instant God removed even him from public office and turned him into the fields like an ox.

But God treated Nebuchadnezzar this way in order to help him. He wanted him to repent so He could forgive him and grant him eternal life. God loves the whole world (John 3:16); and God loved that boastful, impulsive, generous, cruel person, Nebuchadnezzar.

In the New Testament, Paul says, "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all men, for kings and all who are in high positions" (1 Timothy 2:1, 2).

Prayers, intercessions, thanksgivings! How long has it been since you thanked God for your leaders? Even bad governments provide some public service. Most people agree that even tyranny is better than anarchy and that bad laws are better than no laws. We can thank God, then, for the good things in whatever government we may have.

Disagreement is one thing; disrespect is another. Suppose that everyone, all Christians anyway, never spoke disrespectfully about their leaders! Suppose that Christian families discussed government leaders openly but understandingly and prayed earnestly for God to guide them — and to forgive them!

Jesus showed this kind of respect for leaders when He lived on earth. For example, one day a group of leaders heartlessly led a certain woman to Him to be publicly condemned. Jesus knew at a glance that although her sins were bad enough, their sins were worse. He could have embarrassed them easily enough. Instead He knelt and wrote their sins with His finger on

the dusty ground. When the leaders noticed what He was doing, they quietly stepped away. When they were all gone, the first sandals to pass over the spot obliterated the record (see John 8:1-11).

Jesus respected those sinful leaders because He loved them and wanted to save them. "The Son of man," He said once, speaking of Himself, "came to seek and to save the lost" (Luke 19:10).

It is true that on another occasion (Matthew 23), Jesus preached a sermon in which He listed the leaders' sins publicly. But this was in an effort to save those very leaders — three days before He died on the cross. Christ's voice as He listed their sins was that of a brokenhearted lover.

The message that "God rules the kingdoms of men" is repeated in Romans 13, where Paul says: "You must all obey the governing authorities. Since all government

comes from God, the civil authorities were appointed by God, and so anyone who resists authority is rebelling against God's decision, and such an act is bound to be punished... The authorities are there to serve God: they carry out God's revenge by punishing wrongdoers. You must obey, therefore, not only because you are afraid of being punished, but also for conscience's sake" (Romans 13:5).


There *are* times when we must disobey the state, but in such cases our consciences may not be safe guides! One person's conscience says, "Join the army and kill the enemy." Another person's conscience says, "Stay out of the army and be a pacifist." A third person's conscience says, "Join the army if the state requires

it, but use the opportunity to heal people rather than to kill them *because the Bible says*, "You shall not kill" (Exodus 20:13). (This last was Desmond Doss's position; see last month's issue.)

Since conscience alone cannot be a safe guide, the only safe guide is the Bible.

As a worshipper of the true God, young Daniel had probably felt very awkward about enrolling in the Babylonian "state college" of his day. He knew it was corrupted with idolatrous and pseudoscientific principles. But when the king assigned him to attend, he knew of no Bible command that said he should not; so he obeyed the king. But when unhealthy food was served (which the Bible forbids; see Leviticus 11), he refused to eat it at the risk of his life. Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego would no doubt have preferred to stay away from the Plain of Dura. They knew it was morally dangerous to stand on the site of so severe a temptation. But the king ordered them to attend; and, knowing no Bible command against doing so, they obeyed. But the Bible says plainly that we should not bow down to images (Exodus 20:4-6); so they refused to bow, even at the risk of the fiery furnace.

"The things that are revealed belong to us and to our children" (Deuteronomy 29:29). I encourage my students to believe that if a policeman arrests them when they have been violating traffic laws, they should remember

that “the civil authorities were appointed by God” and “are there to serve God: they carry out God’s revenge by punishing wrongdoers” (Romans 13:1, 4). One day, one of my students reported that he had remembered my counsel. After the policeman completed his ticket, the young man asked if he could read him a passage from the Bible, and he proceeded to read the first few verses of Romans 13.

When I mention this incident to my friends, they ask, “Did the policeman tear up the ticket?” And when I say no, they seem disappointed. But what actually happened was more impressive. The policeman went away with renewed determination to be faithful, and the student drove on determined to drive carefully — and with a happy spirit instead of bitterness.

God respects leadership, and He wants us to as well.

### **God Is Generous in Appointing Prophets**

We have an example of this from the time of Daniel. When Daniel served in Babylon as God’s ambassador to the royal palace, God had two other prophets in service also. Jeremiah, who was older than Daniel, worked in Palestine and later in Egypt (see Jeremiah 29:1; 43:4-8). Ezekiel worked in Babylon. Ezekiel was apparently about the same age as Daniel; he lived in a Jewish settlement near Nippur on the important irrigation canal, Nar Kabari, known in the Bible as the River Chebar (Ezekiel 1:1; 43:3).

The sixteen Bible prophets from Isaiah to Malachi are well known. Less well known are numerous other prophets in the Bible, such as Gad the seer (I Chronicles 29:29) and Huldah the woman prophet (II Chronicles 34:22). Often, as in Daniel’s day, God supplied more than one prophet at a time. Micah served at the same time as Isaiah, for example. Compare Micah 1:1 with Isaiah 1:1. In the New Testament the four daughters of Philip all served as prophets at the same time (Acts 21:8, 9), as did Agabus, Judas, Silas, and others (see Acts 15:22; 21:10). Once, in

the Old Testament, God put His Spirit into seventy prophets on the same day (Numbers 11:24, 25).

In the twentieth century, we look expectantly for the final fulfillment of Joel 2:28, "It shall come to pass afterward, that I will pour out my spirit on all flesh; and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy."

God is generous in raising up prophets. He wants to communicate with us because He cares about us.

But to return to Daniel and his times... During the great crisis of the exile God used not only Daniel in Babylon but Ezekiel also. In addition, He inspired Jeremiah with prophetic messages, first in Judea and later in Egypt, when certain nonexiled Jews migrated there. In His generosity, God moved Daniel, Ezekiel, and Jeremiah to write over 100 chapters of prophetic material just when it was most sorely needed.

Now, we know that Daniel was acquainted with Jeremiah. Compare Daniel 9:1, 2 with Jeremiah 29:10. Probably he was also acquainted with his other contemporary prophet, Ezekiel. The town of Nippur, where Ezekiel seems to have lived, was only 50 miles southeast from the city of Babylon.

In 587 B.C., some nineteen years before Nebuchadnezzar had his dream about the tall tree, Ezekiel was inspired to tell the pharaoh of Egypt that God likened *him* to a tall tree (Ezekiel 31). Ezekiel warned the pharaoh that in order to punish his pride, God was planning to send Nebuchadnezzar to cut him down (see Ezekiel 29:19; 30:10). Ezekiel also sounded a general warning that no other tree — that is, no other king or kingdom — should aspire to grow too tall (see Ezekiel 31:14).

In view of Daniel's special status with Nebuchadnezzar and his desire to see him converted, it seems likely that Daniel showed Nebuchadnezzar this parallel message from Ezekiel to pharaoh. ■

### Kingfisher Faith

In a video on his publisher's website, Eugene Peterson tells of watching a kingfisher repeatedly dive for fish in a lake. Peterson counted 37 dives before the kingfisher caught its supper! "And he's the king fisher!" Peterson chuckles. From that bird-watching episode, he gleaned a ministry lesson: It may take a long time and many attempts — maybe dozens! — before something works out.

God calls us to live out his love faithfully, even when we don't seem to be accomplishing anything. Maybe we extend 36 invitations to worship, work 36 monthly shifts at a food bank or utter 36 prayers without seeing results. "What's the point?" we wonder. But the kingfisher urges us on: "Maybe number 37 is the charm!"

### Enter In

Tired of making small talk at church about the weather or sports? Then follow Edward Welch's advice to "enter in" to the lives of your fellow worshipers.

A churchgoer once asked Welch, author of *Caring for One Another*, two simple yet profound questions: "What was the best thing about your week, and what was the worst thing about your week?" About a month later, when some issues were weighing heavily on Welch's heart, he wondered who'd be willing to pray for him. Immediately, the person who'd asked him those two questions came to mind.

When worshipers are willing to enjoy one another's blessings and be burdened by one another's difficulties, Welch says, the body of Christ gets built up. ■

## YOUR BIBLE QUESTIONS . . . ANSWERED

### Why is it necessary to be “born again” to be saved?

*“Most assuredly...unless one is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God” (John 3:3).*


If everyone is already a child of God, is it really necessary to be born again?

The Bible says, “As many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God, to those who believe in His name: who were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God” (John 1:12, 13). This passage says that “to become” children of God, we must believe in His name. The result of accepting Christ as your Savior is being born again.

Jesus told Nicodemus that unless he was born again, he could not see the kingdom of God. Nicodemus was initially confused by this metaphor, so Christ clarified, “Most assuredly...unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God. That which is born of the flesh is flesh, and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit” (John 3:5, 6). The flesh refers to our natural birth, and the Spirit speaks of our spiritual rebirth. We all have been born of the flesh, but not everyone has been born of the Spirit. (See also I Corinthians 15:50.)

It is a fundamental belief in Christianity that we must recognize we are sinners. Seeing that we need Jesus as our Savior, we come to Him, confess our sins, and ask Him to cleanse us and create a new heart within us. God will never force us, so unless we willingly ask Jesus into our hearts, the Lord cannot fully work within us.

In the Bible, we see John the Baptist baptizing people in the waters of the Jordan. The disciples of Christ also baptized. Baptism is a symbol of a new birth — just as when a baby emerges from its protective envelope of water and takes its first breath. This sacred ceremony is the public declaration that we’re on God’s side and have become His children. It’s important for our own spiritual growth and as a witness to others. ■
