

A TRAVESTY OF JUSTICE

"And they bound Jesus, led Him away, and delivered Him to Pilate" (Mark 15:1).

Jesus now stood sentenced to death by the highest court of the land. To carry out the sentence the Sanhedrin must hand Him over to Roman authorities. When the condemnation of Jesus was pronounced by the judges, a satanic fury took possession of the people. The roar of voices was like that of wild beasts. The crowd made a rush toward Jesus, crying, He is guilty, put Him to death! Had it not been for the Roman soldiers, Jesus would not have lived to be nailed to the cross of Calvary. He would have been torn in pieces before His judges, had not Roman authority interfered and by force of arms restrained the violence of the mob.


Heathen men [the Romans] were angry at the brutal treatment of one against whom nothing had been proved. The Roman officers declared that the Jews in pronouncing condemnation upon Jesus were infringing upon the Roman power, and that it was even against the Jewish law to condemn a man to death upon his own testimony. This intervention brought a momentary lull in the proceedings; but the Jewish leaders were dead to both pity and to shame.

Priests and rulers forgot the dignity of their office and abused the Son of God with foul epithets. They taunted Him with His parentage. They declared that His presumption in proclaiming Himself the Messiah made Him deserving of the most ignominous death. The most dissolute men engaged in infamous abuse of the Savior. An old garment was thrown over His head, and His persecutors struck Him in the face, saying, "Prophesy unto us, Thou Christ, Who is he that smote Thee?" When the garment was

WHEN GOD SURPRISES

I recently followed the footsteps of the apostle Paul on a journey to Greece. What impressed me most was the power of the gospel to changed lives. Paul courageously preached in some of the most influential, sophisticated cities of his day. Hearts were touched. Lives were changed. Entire cities felt the life-transforming grace of God. In this month's Bible lesson we will journey with Paul to some of the political, intellectual, and commercial centers of the ancient world and study together the power of the cross.

1. What prompted the apostle Paul to travel to the European continent? Read Acts 16:6-10.
Paul was sensitive to the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Although he must have been perplexed initally when the doors to preaching the gospel in Asia were closed, he had confidence that if God closed one door, He would open another.
2. Where were Paul's first evangelistic efforts in Europe? Read Acts 16:11, 12.
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
Philippi was a city in Macedonia, northern Greece. It was on the Egnatian Way, the road that connected East and West. This influential city probably had a population of more than 100,000

Daniel 5: God Writes on a Wall

Introduction

On October 12, 539 B.C., Belshazzar, king of Babylon, staged a banquet to which he invited a thousand civic leaders with their wives and mistresses. Wine flowed, spirits rose, and realities became blurred.

The realities were grim.

In the twenty-three years since the death of Nebuchadnezzar, Babylon had fallen a long way from its golden age.

Nebuchadnezzar had been succeeded by a series of incompetent rulers. His son, Evil-Merodach (see Jeremiah 52:31), hadn't amounted to much and had been assassinated by his brother-in-law after only two years on the throne. The brother-in-law had died four years later, leaving a minor son. Conspirators had then assassinated the boy king and appointed one of themselves, Nabonidus, as his successor, who is believed

to be Nebuchadnezzar's son-inlaw (married to Nebuchadnezzar's daughter).

Six years later, King Nabonidus had transferred his headquarters from Babylon to the distant oasis of Tema in Arabia. He had "entrusted the kingship to his son," Belshazzar, and devoted himself avidly to the worship of the moon god, Sin, instead of to the Babylonian patron god, Marduk.

(In choosing to worship Sin, Nabonidus had been influenced by his mother, or grandmother, a high priestess of that deity. This amazing woman lived to the exceptional age of 107! At 104 she is reported to have said, in a cuneiform inscription, "My eyesight was keen, my hearing

excellent...food and drink agreed with me.")

For ten years, Nabonidus had failed — by reason of his absence — to celebrate the popular New Year's Festival in Babylon. Further, during his reign he had required even high-class Babylonians to work for the state in labor gangs. At the same time, financial recession had led to a general state of disrepair at the capital. Nabonidus had become highly unpopular.

Meanwhile, Cyrus the Great, the Persian king, had begun his astonishing rise. He had taken over the kingdom of Media and added Lydia in the far west. Nabonidus, evidently alarmed at the buildup of Persian power, had returned from Tema to Babylon in 540. In a bid for popularity at the capital, he had celebrated the New Year's Festival in fine style and collected gods and goddesses from several outlying cities. But he hadn't been able to refrain from arguing theology with the leading priests, and anyway it was too late to restore his popular support.

When he met the forces of Cyrus at Opis, 115 miles north of Babylon, his own people there had rebelled against him. On October 10, 539 B.C., Nabonidus had surrendered Sippar, 50 miles north of Babylon, without a fight and fled south to Borsippa. Meantime, a military detachment led by Darius the Mede had proceeded rapidly south and arrived at the walls of Babylon.





These, then, were the grim realities attending Belshazzar's feast: the empire virtually lost, Nabonidus in hiding, the enemy at the gates.

But why worry? The walls of Babylon were tall and stout. Its storehouses bulged with food. The Euphrates flowed with water. Any enemy would give up a blockade long before the city surrendered. Babylon was undefeatable.

Just as the Titanic was unsinkable...

As the wine took effect, Belshazzar blasphemously ordered his butlers to bring out the sacred utensils which Nebuchadnezzar had removed from the temple in Jerusalem long years before. And while the banqueters drank toasts to their idols out of cups dedicated to the Lord, a mysterious hand began to trace flaming letters on the plaster — the famous "handwriting on the wall."

Wild with fear, shaking like a reed, Belshazzar struggled to clear his brain and focus his eyes. The message

was menacing — of that he was certain — but what was it? His voice sounded hollow, strange even to himself, as he yelled for someone to summon the wise men.

Time dragged as the wise men were rounded up and herded in. The king made a lavish offer of promotion to "third ruler in the kingdom" to anyone who could give the interpretation. But in vain. No one could even read the writing, let alone interpret it.

At that point the queen entered the hall. Since Belshazzar's wives were already present, the "queen" in this case must have been the queen mother, a person of great respect in ancient times. Her suggestion was that Belshazzar send for the prophet Daniel.

YOU,
Belshazzar,

have not humbled your heart,



Belshazzar agreed, and time hung heavy once more as a runner sprinted to Daniel's home. Effects of alcohol subsided, minds began to clear, and in due course, the grand old prophet came striding in. Though Daniel was in his eighties, we have no trouble imagining his "radiant appearance" (Daniel 10:8) — the relative smoothness of his skin, the spring in his step, the ring in his voice. What a contrast he made to the debauchery that surrounded him! How thankful to God he must have been that in his youth he had resolved not to eat or drink unhealthfully!

Daniel omitted the customary salutation, "O king, live forever!" It seemed pointless in view of Belshazzar's imminent death. He was not discourteous to the wayward monarch, but he spoke to the point. In front of the assembled guests and leaders of the nation, he reminded the king of the judgment which had fallen on Nebuchadnezzar on account of his pride; how his mind had become like that of an animal until he confessed that the most high God rules in the kingdom of men. These sober words followed: "And you, his son, Belshazzar, have not humbled your heart, though you knew all this, but you have lifted up yourself against the Lord of heaven" and drunk out of His sacred vessels (Daniel 5:21-23).

The "handwriting on the wall" still lingered, glowing like a neon sign. "MENE, MENE, TEKEL, and PARSIN," Daniel read, easily enough. He paused before giving the interpretation.

"MENE," he read again. "God has numbered the days of your kingdom and brought it to an end; TEKEL, you have been weighed in the blanaces and found wanting; PERES, your kingdom is divided and given to the Medes and Persians" (Verses 26, 27).

(In Aramaic, "Mene" means "counted" or "numbered." "Tekel" means "weighed," "Parsin" is the plural for "Peres," which in the singular means "divided" but in the plural is also the spelling for "Persians.")

It seems almost grotesque under the circumstances, but Belshazzar was as good as his word. He had his aides slip a purple robe over Daniel's shoulders, hang a golden ornament of office around his neck, and proclaim him the "third ruler" in a kingdom that had only moments left to run.

The river Euphrates normally flowed low in October. Two ancient historians, Herodotus and Xenophon, both inform us that on the night of this fatal feast the enemy lowered the water further by temporarily diverting it. Soldiers waded through the knee-high stream, discovered the river gates still open, gained access to the streets, and slew the unsuspecting guards.

"That very night Belshazzar the Chaldean king was slain" (Daniel 5:30).

Two and a half weeks later, Cyrus the Great led the main body of his troops into the city in peace, while joyous crowds symbolically tossed leafy twigs in his path. (The Jews would welcome Christ the same way when He entered Jerusalem 569 years later.) True to prophecy, the head of gold gave

way to the breast and arms of silver.

You have heard all your life about "the handwriting on the wall." You have known that it warned of a sudden end to extravagant times. Now you can read the original account of it for yourself in the Bible in Daniel, chapter 5.



The Message of Daniel 5

God and the Fall of Babylon

The fall of Babylon is of great importance to our understanding of the overall message of Daniel and Revelation. Two aspects in particular demand our attention: (1) The fall of *symbolic* Babylon is one of the leading themes in the book of Revelation. It

is associated there with soon-to-be-fulfilled prophecies strikingly parallel to prophecies about the fall of literal Babylon. (2) The *perfect fulfillment* of the prophecies about the imminent fall of *literal* Babylon helps confirm our confidnece in the prophecies about the imminent fall of *symbolic* Babylon.

Parallels. You will certainly want to pause at this point and at least glance over Isaiah, chapters 41, 46, and 47; Jeremiah, chapters 50 and 51; and Revelation, chapters 16 to 19. You will be struck by numerous parallels in the chart below:

It is noteworthy that the final fall of both Babylons makes the universe very happy. "The heavens and the earth, and all that is in them, shall sing for joy," says Jeremiah 51:48, referring to the ruin of literal Babylon. "Rejoice over her, O heaven," says Revelation 18:20, in reference to the demise of spiritual Babylon.



The Comfort of Our Middle-C God

During college, while living in a boarding house, author Lloyd Douglas befriended a retiree. The man, a homebound former music teacher, shared a morning ritual with Douglas, who would walk down to the man's floor, open his door and ask, "What's the good news?"

Every day the man responded by tapping a tuning fork against his wheelchair and saying, "That's middle C. It was middle C yesterday. It will be middle C tomorrow. It will be middle C a thousand years from now. The tenor upstairs sings flat, the piano across the hall is out of tune, but, my friend, that is middle C!"

If middle C's pitch value isn't exactly 261.63 Hz, then your piano needs to be tuned. How comforting that dependability is for musicians — and their listeners.

Like middle C, God is steadfast and reliable. In this fast-paced world, praise God for the good news he declares to us: "I the LORD do not change" (Malachi 3:6).

Faith Journey

Afamily was heading on vacation: two little ones were nestled in car seats; the van was packed. As Dad locked the house and Mom secured the garage, an adult neighbor the kids knew walked up and spoke through an open window. "Where are you going?" The kids shrugged. "Well, what road are you taking?" the friend asked with a knowing smile. Of course, they had no idea. "Do you know where you'll eat today, or where you'll spend the night?" Blank stares. Then the friend asked, "Who are you traveling with?" The children broke into grins and shouted, "Mommy and Daddy!"

On the journey of faith, we don't know precisely where we're headed or how all our needs will be met. But we know who we're traveling with: our loving God who is fully aware of the twists and turns ahead; the loving Parent who promises to care for us wherever we go.



YOUR BIBLE QUESTIONS ... ANSWERED

How do you help people who have had negative experiences with church or Christians?

"You shall be called the Repairer of the Breach" (Isaiah 58:12).

It's unfortunate that anyone has felt ignored, rejected, ostracized, or injured by another church member or group of members. The church should be a loving and safe place, a sanctuary where sinners come to find hope, healing, and spiritual nurturing. But it doesn't always work out that way. People don't always follow the Lord's command to love one antoher, and often the result is that someone leaves the church. We should search for these people with enthusiasm, like the woman searching for her lost coin or the shepherd for the missing sheep (Luke 15). Searching is always the first step in bringing the lost home.

In the story of the lost sheep, the shepherd searches relentlessly until he finds it. Then he lays it on his shoulders and lovingly carries it back home. The Lord wants us to follow His example and send out search parties to look for the lost sheep among us. These missing sheep are our neighbors, friends, and family who have wandered away from the flock.

Here are some specific ways you can help someone who has left the church:

First, pray for them. God promises, "If My people who are called by My name will humble themselves and pray and seek My face, and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land" (II Chronicles 7:14). Prayer is powerful.

Second, invite them back! The biggest issue facing former members is how to reconnect with the church. They could be waiting for the invitation, so you can be the one to help them find a path back. In some cases, a friendly visit or phone call might be all that is needed. Remember to treat missing members the way you would want to be treated. Offer a warm, no-pressure invitation. Be loving and nonjudgmental, and leave room for the Holy Spirit to work in their hearts.

Third, we should also "receive one another, just as Christ received us" (Romans 15:7). Be prepared to receive with open arms those who return, as the father received the prodigal son (Luke 15:20). The shepherd in Jesus' story called his friends and neighbors in for a celebration. He told them, "Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep which was lost!"

At the end of the parable, Jesus says, "There will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine just persons who need no repentance" (Luke 15:7). Shouldn't we feel the same way? Imagine how a person would feel if the entire church turned out to celebrate their return!
