### JESUS Selected Studies on the Life of Christ By David Metzler

### MARY MAGDALENE

"Now when He rose early on the first day of the week, He appeared first to Mary Magdalene" (Mark 16:9).



Mary had followed Peter and John back to the garden. Now they had returned to Jerusalem while she remained behind. As she looked into the empty tomb, grief filled her heart. Looking in, she saw the two angels... "Woman, why weepest thou?" they asked her. "Because they have taken away my Lord," she answered, "and I know not where they

have laid him" Another voice addressed her, "Woman, why weepest thou? Whom seekest thou?" Through her tear-dimmed eyes, Mary saw the form of a man, and thinking that it was the gardener, she said, "Sir, if thou have borne him hence, tell me where thou has laid him, and I will take him away." If this rich man's tomb was thought too honorable a burial place for Jesus, she herself would provide a place for Him.

Jesus' first appearance after His death wasn't to Peter, John, or even His own mother, but to Mary Magdalene. Mary, who had loved Him so much for His forgiveness and love that she had anointed His body with expensive perfume before burial. Staying at the cross until the very end, she had followed the body to the sepulcher, was first to the tomb on Sunday morning, and had lingered behind in tears when the news was confirmed that her Master was missing. To Mary, Jesus came first!

But now in His own familiar voice Jesus said to her, "Mary." Now she knew that it was not a stranger who was addressing her, and turning she saw before her the living Christ. In her joy she forgot that He had been crucified. Springing toward Him, as if to embrace His feet, she said, "Rabboni." But Christ raised His hand, saying, Detain Me not; "for I am not yet ascended to My Father: but go to My brethren, and say unto them, I ascend unto My Father, and your Father; and to My God and your God." Jesus had not forbidden her to touch His resurrected body, but rather He wished first to ascend to His Father, there to receive the assurance that His sacrifice has been accepted... After His temporary ascension Jesus permitted, without protest, the act He now asked Mary to postpone. Hurrying to the disciples, she told them that she had seen Jesus, but they did not believe her.

Do you believe that He has risen? Your answer is critical to your acceptance of Him.

### LIVING IN THE END TIME

### OUR DAY IN THE LIGHT OF PROPHECY

In 1966, an excited group of townspeople gathered on a dock in Nanaimo, British Columbia, to view the *Queen of Barnaby*, a \$3.5 million vessel. Their interest suddenly turned to consternation. For the ship, without captain or crew, broke her moorings and sped out into the bay, apparently destined for disaster. A repairman had left the engine gear in a forward running position the previous night. So the *Queen of Barnaby* lurched away as soon as someone started the engines to check them. A collision was averted only because another quick-thinking repairman found the switch which dropped the huge ship's anchor.

Do you ever feel like the world today has broken from its moorings and is headed out toward some disaster, without captain or crew? We're used to hearing news of impending doom from any number of causes: the population explosion, famine and starvation, nuclear terrorism, ecological collapse — the list goes on...

I'd like to give you a very different picture of where we're headed. Believe it or not, we have strong evidence that there is a design to history — a plan for this planet. And it's a plan with a great track record; we can look back right now and see how accurate it has been. The evidence is in the Book of Daniel.

### A Dream of the Future

A young Hebrew noble named Daniel was taken captive when King Nebuchadnezzar captured Jerusalem. Taken to Babylon, he was trained for three years in the royal courts and then elevated to a position of prominence in the Babylonian Empire.

One night King Nebuchadnezzar had a dream. When he awoke in the morning, he sensed that the dream had great significance regarding the future, yet he couldn't remember exactly what he had seen.

The king thought his fortune tellers and astrologers — the most educated men in the realm — might help him. He summoned the group and ordered them to tell him what he had dreamed and what it meant.

"That's not quite fair," was the reply. "You tell us what you dreamed, and then we will interpret it."


But that was the problem. Nebuchadnezzar couldn't remember what he'd dreamed. In a fury, he sent these men off with a threat: "Unless you tell me what I dreamed, your heads will roll."

Word spread quickly through the courts of Babylon and reached Daniel. He gathered a few Hebrew friends and prayed earnestly about the crisis, asking the God of heaven to reveal the dream that had been given to Nebuchadnezzar in his bedroom. God miraculously opened Daniel's mind.

The details of the dream became clear and the divine interpretation plain.

Daniel asked to be taken before the King. When he was ushered into the throne room, Nebuchadnezzar asked anxiously, "Are you able to tell me what I saw in my dream and interpret it?"

The Hebrew made this wonderful reply, "There is a God in heaven who reveals mysteries. He has shown King Nebuchadnezzar what will happen in days to come" (Daniel 2:28). This dream would open human eyes to the future course of history. Daniel proceeded to describe this most unusual dream:



"You looked, O king, and there

before you stood a large statue — an enormous dazzling statue, awesome in appearance. The head of the statue was made of pure gold, its chest and arms of silver, its belly and thighs of bronze, its legs of iron, its feet partly of iron and partly of baked clay. While you were watching, a rock was cut out, but not by human hands. It struck the statue on its feet of iron and clay and smashed them. Then the iron, the clay, the bronze, the silver and the gold were broken to pieces at the same time and became like chaff on a threshing floor in the summer. The wind swept them away without leaving a trace. But the rock that struck the statue became a huge mountain and filled the whole earth" (Daniel 2:31-35).

I can imagine Nebuchadnezzar enthusiastically replying, "That's exactly what I saw! How did you know?" But Daniel wasn't finished; he proceeded to reveal what God was trying to communicate through this dream.

### Babylon: 605 B.C. - 539 B.C.

Each segment of the statue represented a successive world kingdom in history. Daniel began at the top, with the gilded head: "You, O king, are the king of kings. The God of heaven has given you dominion and power and might and glory... You are that head of gold."

As with most time-sequence prophecies, this one began with the time in which the speaker was living. Babylon, the mighty metropolis of antiquity, boasted walls more than 200 feet high and so wide that three chariots could drive abreast on top. The Greek historian Herodotus writes

of how lavishly the Babylonians used gold, especially in the temple services. Discussing the golden god of Babylon, Bel-Marduk, he affirms that the god was seated on a golden throne in front of a golden table and golden altar — all within a golden temple. Yes, Babylon is accurately depicted as the head of gold.

And Nebuchadnezzar wanted that glory to last forever. Many of the bricks excavated at Babylon have his name stamped on them. He longed for a kingdom that would stand as an everlasting monument. But Daniel had a different picture of the future: "After you, another kingdom will rise, inferior to yours" (Daniel 2:39).

### Medo-Persia: 539 B.C. - 331 B.C.

In a later chapter in the book of Daniel, this event is actually described. King Belshazzar sits on the throne of Babylon. During a night of drunken feasting he is terrified by these words written on the wall by an unseen hand: "You have been weighed on the scales and found wanting... Your kingdom is divided and given to the Medes and Persians."

In 539 B.C. the Persian general Cyrus conquered the city of Babylon and ushered in a Medo-Persian empire. Amazingly enough, this man was mentioned by the prophet Isaiah 150 years before this event took place. Isaiah 45:1 reads: "This is what the Lord says to his anointed, to Cyrus, whose right hand I take hold of to subdue nations before him and to strip kings of their armor, to open gates before him so that gates will not be shut."

The Euphrates River ran through the center of the city of Babylon. Cyrus had his engineers divert the river so that its water level dropped dramatically. Cyrus sent some of his troops down the riverbed. They found the gates on either side of the river open and unguarded — that was the night of drunken feasting. That is how Cyrus' forces captured the city. And Isaiah caught a glimpse of it — 150 years before it happened!

But this Medo-Persian kingdom of silver was not to last forever either...

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### GOD CARES: The Message of Daniel

### Daniel 10: God's Angels Care for Us

### Introduction

If you think that Daniel has already taught us so much that there is little left to learn, you're in for a surprise.

Chapters 10, 11, and 12 form a new unit. Chapter 10 is the introduction, and it offers one of the most fascinating behind-the-scenes revelations of all time.

Daniel and his attendants were walking beside the river Tigris, which at one point flowed only about 35 miles from Babylon. The time was spring in the "third year of King Cyrus," probably 535 B.C. Seventy years had passed since Daniel had been compelled to accompany Nebuchadnezzar's army on its march from Jerusalem to Babylon. He had been about seventeen then. He was nearing ninety now.

God had been good. He had cared for Daniel in every crisis, answering his prayers, keeping him physically fit (Daniel 10:8), and using him to bless his generation.

But now a crisis had developed again. Work on the Jerusalem temple, so recently launched in response to Cyrus's authorization, had run into stiff opposition from surrounding tribesmen. Ezra 4:5 indicates that hostile Samaritans had even "hired counselors" against the Jews, probably meaning that they had bribed government officials to influence King Cyrus to rescind his decree. With only the altar completed so far, further restoration of God's only temple in the entire world was imperiled. Characteristically, Daniel had taken to his knees. What a praying person he was!

Daniel had prayed, instead of complaining, when threatened with execution in Daniel 2. He had given thanks three times a day when faced with hungry lions. While studying Jeremiah's seventy-year prophecy, he had confessed his sins and those of his people. Now we find him praying again.

Very much in earnest, this time he fasted for "three weeks," from the fourth to the twenty-fourth of the "first month" of the year (see Daniel 10:2-4). His fast thus occupied most of Nisan and included the seven days of unleavened bread which followed Passover. Passover had reminded him of God's mighty power in delivering Israel from Egypt nearly a thousand years before. So Daniel found a secluded place on the Tigris where he could beseech God to reveal His mighty power on Israel's behalf again.

For three weeks he ate only plain things, avoiding rich foods and desserts, so his mind could be as clear as possible for communing with Heaven.

God answered Daniel's prayers as wonderfully when he was old as when he was young. In fact, more so. In Daniel 2 He answered by replaying Nebuchadnezzar's image dream. In Daniel 6, He sent an angel to tame the lions. In Daniel 9, He sent His highest created angel, Gabriel. In Daniel 10, He sent His Son.

### A Glorious Vision of Jesus

That the glorious Being who appeared to Daniel on the banks of the Tigris in this, his fifth vision, *was* Jesus, the Son of God, is proved by comparing Daniel's account of what he saw with the description John wrote of the glorified Jesus who appears in his vision on the island of Patmos (Revelation 1:13-16).


Both John and Daniel saw a Being of transcendent beauty and ineffable radiance robed like a priest. The complex metaphors they used to describe Him were appropriate to Hebrew poetic thought. (Compare, for instance, the description of a beautiful woman in Song of Solomon 4:1-8). The same Christ is described in simpler language as He appeared to Peter, James, and John in sublime majesty on the mount of transfiguration: "He was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his garments became white as light... glistening, intensely white" (Matthew 17:2; Mark 9:3).

When the three disciples saw Jesus glorified, they "fell on their faces and were filled with awe." Soon Jesus touched them and said, "Rise, and have no fear" (Matthew 17:6, 7). When John saw Jesus in vision, he "fell at his feet as one dead," but Jesus laid a hand on him and said, "Fear

not" (Revelation 1:17). When Daniel saw Jesus, he too fell to the ground, until a hand touched him and a voice said, "Fear not" (Daniel 10:10-12).

Daniel was almost overpowered three times. For a while he even stopped breathing. Three times he was encouraged. At last he was significantly "strengthened" (verse 18, 19) and enabled to observe the vision as it continued.

When Saul, nearing Damascus, experienced his vision of Christ, he and his companions fell to the ground, but he alone discerned the full impact of the vision (see Acts




9:1-19; 22:4-16; 26:9-18). In Daniel's case, "great trembling" took hold of the attendants who accompanied him; and like Paul, "Daniel, alone saw the vision" (Daniel 10:7).

At His second coming, Jesus will once more appear in His glory, and "all the tribes of the earth will mourn" (Matthew 25:31; 24:30). His saints, however, will rejoice and shout, "This is our God; we have waited for Him... let us be glad and rejoice in His salvation" (Isaiah 25:9).

### Daniel's Prayer Answered

After seeing the vision of Jesus in His glory, and after being reassured, Daniel



learned from an angel — whom many assume to have again been Gabriel, who appeared to him in the visions of chapters 8 and 9 — that his three-week-long prayer had begun to be answered on the first day he began to pray! Said the angel, "Fear not, Daniel, for from the *first day* that you set your mind to understand and humbled yourself before your God, your words have been heard, and I have come because of your words" (Daniel 10:12).

### Angels in Conflict with Demons

Then the angel added, "The prince of the kingdom of Persia withstood me twenty-one days; but Michael, one of the chief princes, came to help me" (verse 13).

Who was this "prince of the kingdom of Persia" who dared to resist an angel of God for three full weeks?

He was not King Cyrus, whose titles included Great King, King of Babylon, and King of Lands. This person was the "prince" of Persia, and he is introduced to us as occupying a capacity analogous in some way to that of the other "princes" who are mentioned in this chapter — the "prince of Greece" in verse 20 and Michael "your prince" in verse 21. In Daniel 12:1 Michael is further introduced as "the great prince who has charge of your people."

The prince of Persia was evidently an angel-prince who identified



himself with the Persian Empire. Because he opposed an angel of God for three weeks, we conclude that he was an evil angel. Second Peter 2:4 speaks of angels who sinned and were cast out of heaven. says that the gods whom the nations of his day worshiped were in reality demons (I Corinthians 10:20). Paul also disclosed that our real enemies are not ordinary people made of "flesh and blood" but are the "principalities" and "powers," the "spiritual hosts of wickedness," and the "world rulers of this present darkness" (Ephesians 6:12). Jesus three times identified

Satan as the "prince" or "ruler" of this present world (John 12:31; 14:30; 16:11).

So the New English Bible and Today's English Version of Daniel 10:13 both speak about "the angel prince of the kingdom of Persia." The Interpreter's Bible refers to the "angel patron of Persia," and the Anchor Bible speaks of "the tutelary spirit of the guardian angel of the Persian kingdom, as the rabbis and most Christian commentators have rightly acknowledged." John Walvoord explains in his book on Daniel, "This 'prince' is not the king of the kingdom of Persia but rather the angelic leader of Persia, a fallen angel under the direction of Satan, in contrast to the angelic prince Michael who leads and protects Israel."

Suddenly the "TV" of Scripture has flashed to a totally unexpected scene. Behind the visible realm, for three weeks day and night, an angel of God has been wrestling with a determined and powerful demon in an attempt to countervail his influence and to prevent Cyrus from rescinding his all-important decree. At last Michael — who defeated the entire army of demons on another occasion (Revelation 12:7) — reinforces Gabriel. The demon is routed, and the king of Persia makes the right decision. Cyrus refuses to acquiesce in the Samaritan scheme to shut down the temple reconstruction. And he will never waver on this matter again.

We are greatly intrigued by this supernatural struggle. It eclipses any Super Bowl game on planet Earth. The stakes are not an annual trophy, ring, or pennant but the future of mankind.

With this introduction — a vision of the glorified Jesus and a revelation of the great controversy that goes on hour by hour behind the scenes — the angel will proceed in chapters 11 and 12 to outline events of history to the end of time.



### **Thunderstorm Blessings**

Thunder is mentioned in the Bible 42 times, and reference to lightning is made 28 times. This should come as no surprise since thunder and lightning are such riveting displays of God's awesome power.

Although the potentially devastating effects of lightning are well known, people are less aware of its beneficial side. Lightning helps to dissolve the atmosphere's nitrogen, enabling it to combine with raindrops, which makes a great fertilizer for plants. Lightning also helps to balance Earth's electrical field, and it contributes to the ozone layer, which helps shield the Earth from the harmful rays of the sun. Lightning storms also clean and revitalize the air.

Our planet is dependant on thunderstorms, and so are we. We couldn't survive for long without them. Next time you see a flash of lightning and hear the rumble of thunder, why not whisper a prayer of thanks to our almighty God, who gives us blessings through the storms?

### Loving an "EGR"

During a conversation over coffee, a friend mentioned an "EGR." I had to interrupt and ask for a definition: Extra Grace Required — in other words, people who can seem tough to love. Often, they are the most in *need* of love because they are hurting. Perhaps Jesus was referring to EGRs when He said, "If you love only those who love you, what reward is there for that? Even corrupt tax collectors do that much" (Matthew 5:46).

Truly loving others — even EGRs — might not be as tough as we think. Simple gestures such as smiling, truly listening, sending a note or extending an invitation go a long way toward expressing care and softening hearts.

At times, we all require extra grace. Thankfully, God has an unlimited amount to extend *to* us and then *through* us. Out of joy, we can find ways — even simple ones — to share God's grace and love with people who need it.

"There is therefore now no condemnation to those who are in Christ Jesus, who do not walk according to the flesh, but according to the Spirit" (Romans 8:1).


As we work toward strengthening our spiritual nature, we need to keep our focus on the things of God. "Those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit, the things of the Spirit" (Romans 8:5). Furthermore, there are certain pitfalls to avoid. Whenever we choose to feed our fleshly nature with worldly amusements and sensual gratification, for instance, our carnal nature will be on the throne and our spirit will lose the battle.

The devil uses worldly reading materials, music, television, and movies, often disguising them as "family entertainment," to tempt us and numb our spiritual sensors. But these instant satisfactions have potentially terrible eternal consequences. They will make your spiritual muscles limp and weak. Remember, when temptation comes, whatever side we have strengthened will win the battle. This is literally a life-and-death struggle, "for to be carnally minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace" (Romans 8:6).

The good news is that if we put our trust in Him, the Lord will make sure we succeed in this effort. He promises to strengthen us. "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13). He reminds

us that He is "able to do exceedingly abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that works in us" (Ephesians 3:20). And He assures us that we can triumph through His power. "Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (I Corinthians 15:57).

Every day, we're making a series of little decisions to walk after the flesh or after the spirit. Pray daily, even hourly, for God's protection and always be mindful when investing time and resources in worldly amusements. Real satisfaction is found in the Prince of Peace, not in empty worldly pleasures.
