A NEW HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

"Then the high priest said, 'are these things so?"

The prosecution had rested after summing up the charges against Stephen (see last month's issue). As Stephen stood face to face with his judges to answer to the charge of blasphemy, a holy radiance shone upon his countenance, and all that sat in the council, looking steadfastly on him, saw his face as it had been the face of an angel. Many who beheld this light trembled and veiled their faces, but the stubborn unbelief and prejudice of the rulers did not waver.

Stephen continued to relate the history of God's dealings with the Jewish nation but with a twist. The proud Jews still insisted Israel was the chosen nation of God. Their religion, their laws, their country, and their temple were superior to all others, as evidenced by the historical acts of God on their behalf. Stephen now changed their historical perspective. He first pointed out the Hebrew nation was established through Abraham when he dwelt in Mesopotamia, not Palestine (Acts 7:2-5). God had miraculously delivered His people from affliction outside the borders of the Promised Land, in Egypt, at the crossing of the Red Sea, and time and again during the wanderings in the Sinai (verses 9-36). The Decalogue was not delivered from the temple mount but from a mount called Sinai in the wilderness (verse 38) — a mount made sacred by the presence of God, for Moses was instructed to remove his shoes out of respect. God is not found exclusively within the temple or any house built with hands but rather reigns from heaven, and the earth is His footstool (verses 48-50). The glory of God is His character.

Stephen also quoted Isaiah 66:1, 2 almost word for word. Isaiah points out that the Most High cannot be confined with human limitations,

but will dwell with those who are "poor and of a contrite spirit." These words were a rebuke to the Jews who heard them. With their worship centered upon the earthly Temple, they were far from being "poor and of a contrite spirit." Stephen's unspoken appeal was to accept the Divine One, who had walked among them so humbly, and had shown them their heavenly Father's lovely character.

Is your loyalty directed toward an institution? Your devotion should be only to Christ and His Word.

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REVELATION SPEAKS

ARMAGEDDON AND THE SEVEN LAST PLAGUES [This chapter is based on Revelation, chapter 15 and 16]

During the last decade, we have witnessed some of the most unprecedented and phenomenal historical events in world history! In fact, commentators have said that world events during this past decade have made the most momentous changes in the world since the Reformation of the sixteenth century. The demise of communism, the fall of the Berlin Wall, nations in quick succession demanding freedom, and world regimes vanishing! Horrendous famines, pestilences, floods, and multiple earthquakes rocking the earth! Wars — and the talk of war! What lies ahead? Will it be World War III? According to Bible prophecy, an outline of coming events is clearly revealed. The crisis at the close of human history is not merely a military struggle, it is the last great battle in the long-standing conflict between Christ and Satan. The seven last plagues prior to and including the Battle of Armageddon focus on the end of human history and the coming of our Lord. Read Revelation 15:1-8; 16:1-21. With this background, let's turn to our study for this chapter.

- 1. What great crisis will this world soon face? Revelation 16:16, 17.
- 2. What will be poured out on those individuals who worship the beast? Revelation 14:9, 10.

NOTE: When every human being has chosen between the Mark of the Beast or the Seal of God, the plagues will fall! A loving God would not possibly allow the plagues to fall without giving each individual the opportunity to avoid them.

3. What is the "wrath of God unmingled with mercy"? Revelation 15:1, 2



4. Upon whom does the first plague fall? Revelation 16:1, 2

NOTE: Men and women do not receive the Mark of the Beast until the entire world has had the opportunity to hear the message of Revelation chapter 14. From this, it is clear that the plagues are still in the future.

5. What statement shows that Christ's work as our intercessor has been completed when the seven last plagues are fallen? Revelation 15:8

NOTE: Revelation 16:2-15 lists the first six plagues:

- 1. Grievous sores
- 2. Sea as blood
- 3. Fountains and rivers of waters as blood
- 4. Sun scorching men
- 5. Darkness on seat of the beast
- 6. Armageddon
- 6. After the first six plagues, what announcement comes from heaven? Revelation 16:15

NOTE: What sense would it make for Jesus to declare that He was coming "as a thief" after the plagues, if He had already come? This text is Christ's encouragement to His followers, urging them to perseverance in light of His soon return. These plagues fell on Egypt in Old Testament times. The first three fell on both the Egyptians and the Israelites; the last seven fell only on the Egyptians. At the end of earth's history the seven last plagues fall only on the wicked, while the righteous, still on earth, are protected).

7. What is the first plague to fall, and how does it affect human beings? Revelation 16:2

NOTE: The plagues are not arbitrary scourges on the part of God. There are eternal principles that govern the universe. One is the law of sowing and reaping (Galatians 6:7, 8). The seeds of evil carry with them their own deadly results. The first plague falls upon those who have the Mark of the Beast (verse 2). The Beast power that enforces the Mark of the Beast says, "unless you receive the Mark you will be physically harmed." In the first plague those who receive the Mark of the Beast are physically afflicted. This first plague clearly reveals that there is no physical security outside of Jesus Christ.

8. Upon what do the second and third plagues fall? Revelation 16:3, 4

NOTE: Just imagine the economic collapse and financial disaster that occurs when the sea becomes a polluted wasteland Certainly there is no economic security outside of Jesus Christ (Matthew 6:33, Philippians 4:19).

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

THE CRUCIFIXION OF CHRIST (Continued)

A Lesson in Filial Love



The eyes of Jesus wandered over the multitude that had collected together to witness His death, and He saw at the foot of the cross John supporting Mary, the mother of Christ. She had returned to the terrible scene, not being able to longer remain away from her Son. The last lesson of Jesus was one of filial love. the love of parent and child. He looked upon the grief-stricken face of His mother, and then upon John; said He, addressing the former: "Woman, behold thy son!" Then, to the disciple: "Behold thy mother!" (John 19:27). John well understood the words of Jesus, and the sacred trust that was committed to him. He immediately removed the mother of Christ from the fearful scene of Calvary. From that hour he cared for her as would a dutiful son, taking her to his own home. The perfect example

of Christ's love for his mother shines forth with undimmed luster from the mist of ages. While enduring the keenest torture, He was not forgetful of His mother, but made all provision necessary for her future.

The mission of Christ's earthly life was now nearly accomplished. His tongue was parched, and he said, "I thirst." They saturated a sponge with vinegar and gall, and offered it to Him to drink; and when He had tasted it, he refused it. And now the Lord of life and glory was dying, a ransom for the race. It was the sense of sin, bringing the Father's wrath upon Him as man's substitute, that made the cup He drank so bitter, and broke the heart of the Son of God.

As man's substitute and surety, the iniquity of men was laid upon Christ; He was counted a transgressor that He might redeem them from the curse of the law. The guilt of every descendant of Adam of every age was

pressing upon His heart; and the wrath of God and the terrible manifestation of His displeasure because of iniquity, filled the soul of His Son with consternation. The withdrawal of the divine countenance from the Saviour in this hour of supreme anguish pierced His heart with a sorrow that can never be fully understood by man. Every pang endured by the Son of God upon the cross, the blood drops that flowed from His head, His hands and feet, the convulsions of agony that racked His frame, and the unutterable anguish that filled His soul at the hiding of His Father's face from Him, speak to man, saying, It is for love of thee that the Son of God consents to have these heinous crimes laid upon Him; for you He spoils the domain of death and opens the gates of Paradise and immortal life. He who stilled the angry waves by His word and walked the foam-capped billows, who made devils tremble and disease flee from His touch, who raised the dead to life and opened the eyes of the blind, offers Himself upon the cross as the last sacrifice for man. He, the sin-bearer, endures judicial punishment for iniquity and becomes sin itself for man.

Satan, with his fierce temptations, wrung the heart of Jesus. Sin, so hateful to His sight, was heaped upon Him till He groaned beneath its weight. No wonder that His humanity trembled in that fearful hour. Angels witnessed with amazement the despairing agony of the Son of God, so much greater than His physical pain, that the latter was hardly felt by Him. The hosts of heaven veiled their faces from the fearful sight.

Inanimate nature expressed a sympathy with its insulted and dying Author. The sun refused to look upon the awful scene. Its full, bright rays were illuminating the earth at midday, when suddenly it seemed to be blotted out. Complete darkness enveloped the cross and all the vicinity about, like a funeral pall. The darkness lasted three full hours. At the ninth hour the terrible darkness lifted from the people, but still [wrapped] the Saviour as in a mantle. The angry lightnings seemed to be hurled at Him as He hung upon the cross. Then "Jesus cried with a loud voice, saying, Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani? Which is, being interpreted, My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?" (Mark 15:34).

It Is Finished

In silence the people watch for the end of this fearful scene. Again the sun shines forth, but the cross is enveloped in darkness. Suddenly the gloom is lifted from the cross, and in clear trumpet tones, that seem to resound throughout creation, Jesus cries, "It is finished." "Father, into Thy hands I commend My spirit" (Luke 23:46). A light encircled the cross, and the face of the Saviour shone with a glory like unto the sun. He then bowed His head upon His breast and died.

At the moment in which Christ died, there were priests ministering in the temple before the veil that separated the holy from the most holy place.

Praise The Lord!

Suddenly they felt the earth tremble beneath them, and the veil of the temple, a strong rich drapery that had been renewed yearly, was rent in [two] from top to bottom by the same bloodless hand that wrote the words of doom upon the walls of Belshazzar's palace.

Jesus did not yield up His life till He had accomplished the work that He came to do; and He exclaimed with His parting breath, "It is finished!" Angels rejoiced as the words were uttered, for the great plan of redemption was being triumphantly carried out. There was joy in heaven that the sons of Adam could now, through a life of obedience, be exalted finally to the presence of God. Satan was defeated and knew that his kingdom was lost.

The Burial

John was at a loss to know what measures he should take in regard to the body of his beloved Master. He shuddered at the thought of its being handled by rough and unfeeling soldiers, and placed in a dishonored burial place. He knew he could obtain no favors from the Jewish authorities, and he could hope little from Pilate. But Joseph and Nicodemus came to the front of this emergency. Both of these men were members of the Sanhedrin, and acquainted with Pilate. Both were men of wealth and influence. They were determined that the body of Jesus should have an honorable burial.

Joseph went boldly to Pilate, and begged from him the body of Jesus for burial. Pilate then gave an official order that the body of Jesus should be given to Joseph. While the disciple John was anxious and troubled about the sacred remains of his beloved Master, Joseph of Arimathea returned with the commission from the governor; and Nicodemus, anticipating the result of Joseph's interview with Pilate, came with a costly mixture of myrrh and aloes of about one hundred pounds' weight. The most honored in all Jerusalem could not have been shown more respect in death.

Gently and reverently they removed with their own hands the body of Jesus from the instrument of torture, their sympathetic tears falling fast as they looked upon His bruised and lacerated form, which they carefully bathed and cleansed from the stain of blood. Joseph owned a new tomb, hewn from stone, which he was reserving for himself; it was near Calvary, and he now

prepared this sepulcher for Jesus. The body, together with the spices brought by Nicodemus, was carefully wrapped in a linen sheet, and the three disciples bore their precious burden to the new sepulcher, wherein



man had never before lain. There they straightened those mangled limbs, and folded the bruised hands upon the pulseless breast. The Galilean women drew near, to see that all had been done that could be done for the lifeless form of their beloved Teacher. Then they saw the heavy stone rolled against the entrance of the sepulcher, and the Son of God was left at rest. The women were the last at the cross, and last at the tomb of Christ.

Although the Jewish rulers had carried out their fiendish purpose in putting to death the Son of God, their apprehensions were not quieted, nor was their jealousy of Christ dead. Mingled with the joy of gratified revenge, there was an ever-present fear that His dead body, lying in Joseph's tomb, would come forth to life. Therefore "the chief priests and Pharisees came together unto Pilate, saying, Sir we remember that that deceiver said, while He was yet alive, After three days I will rise again. Command therefore that the sepulcher be made sure until the third day, lest His disciples come by night, and steal Him away, and say unto the people, He is risen from the dead: so the last error shall be worse that the first" (Matthew 27:63, 64). Pilate was as unwilling as were the Jews that Jesus should rise with power to punish the guilt of those who had destroyed Him, and he placed a band of Roman soldiers at the command of the priests. Said he, "Ye have a watch: go your way, make it as sure as ye can. So they went, and made the sepulcher sure, sealing the stone, and setting a watch" (Matthew 27: 65, 66).

The Jews realized the advantage of having such a guard about the tomb of Jesus. They placed a seal upon the stone that closed the sepulcher, that it might not be disturbed without the fact being known, and took every precaution against the disciples' practicing any deception in regard to the body of Jesus. But all their plans and precautions only served to make the triumph of the resurrection more complete and to more fully establish its truth.

THE RESURRECTION OF CHRIST


The disciples rested on the Sabbath, sorrowing for the death of their Lord, while Jesus, the King of glory, lay in the tomb. As night drew on, soldiers were stationed to guard the Saviour's resting place, while angels, unseen, hovered above the sacred spot. The night wore slowly away, and while it was yet dark the watching angels knew that the time for the release of God's dear Son, their loved Commander, had nearly come. As they were waiting with the deepest emotion the hour of His triumph, a mighty angel came flying swiftly from heaven. His face was like the lightning, and his garments white as snow. His light dispersed the darkness from his track and caused the evil angels, who had triumphantly claimed the body of Jesus, to flee in terror from his brightness and glory. One of the angelic host who had witnessed the scene of Christ's humiliation, and was watching His resting place, joined the angel from heaven, and together they came down to the sepulcher. The earth trembled and shook as they approached, and there was a great earthquake.

Terror seized the Roman guard. Where was now their power to keep the body of Jesus? They did not think of their duty or of the disciples' stealing Him away. As the light of the angels shone around, brighter than the sun, the Roman guard fell as dead men to the ground. One of the angels laid hold of the great stone and rolled it away from the door of the sepulcher and seated himself upon it. The other entered the tomb and unbound the napkin from the head of Jesus.

"Thy Father Calls Thee"

Then the angel from heaven, with a voice that caused the earth to quake, cried out, "Thou Son of God, Thy Father calls Thee! Come forth" Death could hold dominion over Him no longer. Jesus arose from the dead, a triumphant conqueror. In solemn awe the angelic host gazed upon the scene. And as Jesus came forth from the sepulcher, those shining angels prostrated themselves to the earth in worship and hailed Him with songs of victory and triumph.

Satan's angels had been compelled to flee before the bright, penetrating light of the heavenly angels, and they bitterly complained to their king that their prey had been violently taken from them, and that



He whom they so much hated had risen from the dead. Satan and his hosts had exulted that their power over fallen man had caused the Lord of life to be laid in the grave, but short was their hellish triumph. For as Jesus walked forth from His prison house a majestic conqueror, Satan knew that after a season he must die, and his kingdom pass unto Him whose right it was. He lamented and raged that, notwithstanding all his efforts, Jesus had not been overcome but had opened a way of salvation for man, and whosoever would might walk in it and be saved.

The evil angels and their commander met in council to consider how they could still work against the government of God. Satan bade his servants go to the chief priests and elders. Said he, "We succeeded in deceiving them, blinding their eyes and hardening their hearts against Jesus. We made them believe that He was an imposter. That Roman guard will carry the hateful news that Christ has risen. We led the priests and elders on to hate Jesus and to murder Him. Now hold it before them that if it becomes known that Jesus is risen, they will be stoned by the people for putting to death and innocent man."

Ponderings at the End of a Day — or Year

Many of us set New Year's resolutions for self-improvement, asking, "What are my goals? How can I better myself, my weight, my work-life balance, my habits?" But Dutch priest and theologian Henri Nouwen said of his self-inquiry: "Did I offer peace today? Did I bring a smile to someone's face? Did I say words of healing?" Pondering such questions may prove valuable at the end of a year as well: "How did I contribute to peace in the world this past year? Did I bring smiles to others' faces? Did I offer words of healing? Did I let go of my anger and resentment? Did I forgive? Did I love? These are the real questions. I must trust that the little bit of love that I sow now will bear many fruits, here in this world and [in] the life to come." His resolution was to share God's love with others. With God's help, it can be ours as well, for each new day and each new year.

YOUR BIBLE QUESTIONS . . . ANSWERED

Do the righteous dead go directly to heaven? The Bible says that Moses and Elijah appeared with Christ on the Mount of Transfiguration. "Elijah appeared to them with Moses, and they were talking with Jesus" (Mark 9:4).

It is interesting that the very last thing the Old Testament says is, "Remember the Law of Moses, My servant," and, "Behold, I will send you Elijah the Prophet" (Malachi 4:4, 5). Then in Matthew 17:3, we find these two Bible heroes appearing with Jesus and three of His disciples on a mountaintop. This is an important story!

First, the Bible teaches that Elijah never died and was taken in a fiery chariot to heaven (II Kings 2:11). There are a few instances in the Bible when God takes people directly to Himself (see Genesis 5:24). But that is not the case for the majority of Earth's inhabitants. The Scriptures teach that even David did not ascend to heaven at death but is in the grave (Acts 2:34).

So, if Moses died, as is stated in Deuteronomy 34:5, then how could he appear on the Mount of Transfiguration with Elijah and Jesus? There is a reference in Jude 9 that gives us a window into what happened to Moses after his death. "Michael the archangel, in contending with the devil, when he disputed about the body of Moses, dared not bring against him a reviling accusation, but said, 'The Lord rebuke you!'" (Jude 9).

Michael, which is one of the names for Christ (see Daniel 10:31; I Thessalonians 4:16; and Revelation 12:7), was a ruler over the angels,

and He resurrected Moses. Even Jewish tradition states that three days after Moses died, the Lord came and raised him up.

There is another example of a "special" resurrection; it occurred after Jesus died on the cross. "And the graves were opened; and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised; and coming out of the graves after His resurrection, they went into the holy city and appeared to many" (Matthew 27:52, 53). This was an unusual occurrence. Most of us will be raised when the Lord comes the second time. — D.B.

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
