

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I have heard many a pastor lately say that they are afraid to lose people by telling them the truth. The truth of what the Bible says is now construed as being too dangerous to share if we want to increase our numbers at church. Will we turn people off?

Here are a few things to think about. First, What is more important? Church numbers or truth? We could have thousands in church, yet are those thousands following truth, or are they misguided? Did Jesus worry about how many followed Him?

Second, was Jesus afraid to share truth with those He encountered? Reading through the gospels, we can see Him sharing even difficult truths, but of course, He shared it in love and then often told them to "go and sin no more."

Third, what will happen if we do not share truth with them? Are they accountable, are we accountable, or both?

Fourth, do we really love someone if we do not share truth and instead let them continue to believe a lie? Are we exhibiting a caring attitude if we allow them to continue in sin and ultimately wind up destroyed by the brightness of His coming?

Living in this very important time, we have much responsibility and much to contemplate.

A CONFLICTED PHARISEE

"Concerning the law, a Pharisee" (Philippians 3:5).

Paul was devout. His family lived outside Palestine, and therefore, religious training took on increased importance. The lives of most Jewish families centered on their local synagogue. The synagogue was both a social meeting place and a church where regular worship services were held each Sabbath. In some synagogues, a rabbi was hired to teach the young boys the Pentateuch. In towns where the Jewish population was small, religious instruction was centered within the family itself. We know Paul was very familiar with the Septuagint, the Scripture written in Greek, for he quotes it often. Paul probably moved to Jerusalem in his early to mid-teen years to study the Torah under Gamaliel, a member of the Sanhedrin.

When it came to the Torah, there were two main schools of pharisaical interpretation. Both schools traced origins back to the time of Herod the Great, and both were convinced they were correct in their exclusive interpretation of Scripture. Saul enrolled in the school of Hillel. Gamaliel was from this more "liberal" school. There was nothing very liberal about a follower of Hillel, but they were more flexible and open to Greek thought. Followers of Hillel cooperated more with Rome and probably were more in line with Saul's experiences in Tarsus and his exposure to Greek thought and culture He would not have fit in very well in the School of Shammai. Shammaites were extremely conservative in their approach to life and resisted all change, expecially the rules of Rome.

To study at the feet of Gamaliel was a monumental honor. He was considered the exceptional teacher of his generation, and one could do no better than to soak up his interpretation of Scripture and the Law. Gamaliel taught an attitude of nonviolence toward Roman authorities and very much believed all things were ultimately to be left to the will of God. It is, therefore, curious that we find Saul dealing with Christians as would an intolerant Shammaite. "Live and let live" was not in his vocabulary when it came to Christians who were polluting the "pure" Jewish religion.

Gamaliel believed in leaving things up to God to work out. Saul didn't learn that lesson very well in Gamaliel's class! Trusting God is a lesson we all must learn.

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
REVELATION SPEAKS

"THE SPIRIT AND THE BRIDE SAY, 'COME' " [This chapter is based on Revelation, chapter 22.]

When God created Planet Earth, it was perfect! And the people He created were perfect! In fact, the Bible says that when God took inventory of all that He had made, He said that it was very good.

God's original plan for Planet Earth and its inhabitants was that they should be perfect forever. However, Adam and Eve were free to choose whom they would believe and obey, so a God of infinite wisdom had an alternate plan in reserve in the event that man should mar His beautiful original plan for Planet Earth.



When God was forced to evict Adam and Eve from their garden home because of their disobedience, God revealed His plan to restore them to His family and eternal life — His original plan. He said, "I will put enmity between you [the serpent] and the woman, and between your seed and her Seed; He shall bruise your head and you shall bruise His heel" (Genesis 3:15).

Instead, it will be the center or capital of the universe, where God the Father and His Son will reign for all eternity! We are children of the King of the universe, and we shall live and reign with Him forever and ever. Praise the Lord!

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THE STORY OF REDEMPTION by E. G. White

PETER DELIVERED FROM PRISON (This chapter is based on Acts 12:1-23.)

The Answer to Prayer

The apostle made his way direct to the house where his brethren were assembled together for prayer; he found them engaged in earnest prayer for him at that moment. "And as Peter knocked at the door of the gate, a damsel came to hearken, named Rhoda. And when she knew Peter's voice, she opened not the gate for gladness, but ran in and told how Peter stood before the gate. And they said unto her, Thou are mad. But she constantly affirmed that it was even so. Then said they, It is his angel. But Peter continued knocking: and when they had opened the door, and saw him, they were astonished. But



he, beckoning unto them with the hand to hold their peace, declared unto them how the Lord had brought him out of the prison. And he said, Go shew these things unto James, and to the brethren. And he departed, and went into another place."

Joy and praise filled the hearts of the fasting, praying believers, that God had heard and answered their prayers, and delivered Peter from the hand of Herod. In the morning the people gathered together to witness the execution of the apostle. Herod sent officers to bring Peter from prison with great display of arms and guard, in order to ensure against his escape, to intimidate all sympathizers, and to exhibit his own power. There was the guard at the door of the prison, the bolts and bars of the door still fast and strong, the guard inside, the chains to the wrists of the two soldiers; but the prisoner was gone.

Herod's Retribution

When the report of these things was brought to Herod, he was exasperated, and charged the keepers of the prison with unfaithfulness. They were accordingly put to death for the alleged crime of sleeping at their post. At the same time Herod knew that no human power had rescued Peter. But

he was determined not to acknowledge that a divine power had been at work to thwart his base designs. He would not humiliate himself thus, but he set himself boldly in defiance of God.


Herod, not long after Peter's deliverance from prison, went down from Judea to Caesarea and there abode. He there made a grand festival, designed to excite the admiration and applause of the people. Pleasure lovers from all quarters were assembled together, and there was much feasting and wine drinking. Herod made a most gorgeous appearance before the people. He was clad in a robe, sparkling with silver and gold, that caught the rays of the sun in its glittering folds, and dazzled the eyes of the beholders. With great pomp and ceremony he stood before the multitude, and addressed them in an eloquent oration.

The majesty of his appearance and the power of his well-chosen language swayed the assembly with a mighty influence. Their senses were already perverted by feasting and wine; they were dazzled by his glittering decorations and charmed by his grand deportment and eloquent words; and, wild with enthusiasm, they showered upon him adulation, and proclaimed him a god, declaring that mortal man could not present such an appearance or command such startling eloquence of language. They further declared that they had ever respected him as a ruler, but from henceforth they should worship him as a god.

Herod knew that he deserved none of this praise and homage; yet he did not rebuke the idolatry of the people, but accepted it as his due. The glow of gratified pride was on his countenance as he heard the shout ascend: "It is the voice of a god, and not of a man." The same voices that now glorified a vile sinner had, but a few years before, raised the frenzied cry of, Away with Jesus! Crucify Him! Crucify Him! Herod received this flattery and homage with great pleasure, and his heart bounded with triumph; but suddenly a swift and terrible change came over him. His countenance became pallid as death and distorted with agony; great drops of sweat started from his pores. He

stood a moment as if transfixed with pain and terror; then, turning his blanched and livid face to his horror-stricken friends, he cried in hollow, despairing tones, He whom you have exalted as a god is struck with death!

He was borne in a state of the most excruciating anguish from the scene of wicked revelry, the mirth, and pomp, and display of which he now loathed in his soul. A moment before, he had been the proud recipient of the praise and worship

of that vast throng — now he felt himself in the hands of a Ruler mightier than himself. Remorse seized him; he remembered his cruel command to slay the innocent James; he remembered his relentless persecution of the followers of Christ, and his design to put to death the apostle Peter, whom God had delivered out of his hand; he remembered how, in his mortification and disappointed rage, he had wreaked his unreasoning revenge upon the keepers of the prisoner and executed them without mercy. He felt that God, who had rescued the apostle from death, was now dealing with him, the relentless persecutor. He found no relief from pain of body or anguish of mind, and he expected none. Herod was acquainted with the law of God, which says, "Thou shalt have no other gods before Me," and he knew that in accepting the worship of the people he had filled up the measure of his iniquity and had brought upon himself the just wrath of God.

The same angel who had left the royal courts of heaven to rescue Peter from the power of his persecutor, had been the messenger of wrath and judgment to Herod. The angel smote Peter to arouse him from slumber; but it was with a different stroke that he smote the wicked king, bringing mortal disease upon him. God poured contempt upon Herod's pride, and his person, which he had exhibited decked in shining apparel before the admiring gaze of the people, was eaten by worms, and putrified while yet alive. Herod died in great agony of mind and body, under the retributive justice of God.

This demonstration of divine judgment had a mighty influence upon the people. While the apostle of Christ had been miraculously delivered from prison and death, his persecutor had been stricken down by the curse of God. The news was borne to all lands, and it was the means of bringing many to believe on Christ.

IN THE REGIONS BEYOND (This chapter is based on Acts 13:1-4; 15:1-31)

The apostles and disciples who left Jerusalem during the fierce persecution that raged there after themartyrdom of Stephen, preached Christ in the cities round about, confining their labors to the Hebrew and Greek Jews. "And the hand of the Lord was with them: and a great number believed, and turned unto the Lord" (Acts 11:21).

When the believers in Jerusalem heard the good tidings they rejoiced; and Barnabas, "a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith," was sent to Antioch, the metropolis of Syria, to help the church there. He labored there with great success. As the work increased, he solicited and obtained the help of Paul; and the two disciples labored together in that city for a year, teaching the people and adding to the numbers of the church of Christ.

Antioch had both a large Jewish and Gentile population; it was a

great resort for lovers of ease and pleasure, because of the healthfulness of its situation, its beautiful scenery, and the wealth, culture, and refinement that centered there. Its extensive commerce made it a place of great importance, where people of all nationalities were found. It was therefore a city of luxury and vice. The retribution of God finally came upon



Antioch, because of the wickedness of its inhabitants.


It was here that the disciples were first called Christians. This name was given them because Christ was the main theme of their preaching, teaching, and conversation. They were continually recounting the incidents of His life during the time in which His disciples were blessed with His personal company. They dwelt untiringly upon His teachings, His miracles of healing the sick, casting out devils, and raising the dead to life. With quivering lips and tearful eyes they spoke of His agony in the garden, His betrayal, trial, and execution, the forbearance and humility with which He endured the harsh language and torture imposed upon Him by His enemies, and the Godlike pity with which He prayed for those who persecuted Him. His resurrection and ascension and his work in heaven as a Mediator for fallen man were joyful topics with them. The heathen might well call them Christians since they preached of Christ and addressed their prayers to God through Him.

Paul found, in the populous city of Antioch an excellent field of labor, where his great learning, wisdom, and zeal, combined, wielded a powerful influence over the inhabitants and frequenters of that city of culture.

Meanwhile the work of the apostles was centered at Jerusalem, where Jews of all tongues and countries came to worship at the temple during the stated festivals. At such times the apostles preached Christ with unflinching courage, though they knew that in so doing their lives were in constant jeopardy. Many converts to the faith were made, and these, scattering to their homes in different parts of the country, dispersed the seeds of truth throughout all nations and among all classes of society.

Peter, James, and John felt confident that God had appointed them to preach Christ among their own countrymen at home. But Paul had received his commission from God, while praying in the temple, and his broad missionary field had been presented before him with remarkable distinctness. To prepare him for his extensive and important work, God had brought him into close connection with Himself, and had opened before his enraptured vision a glimpse of the beauty and glory of heaven.

Giving Thanks for ALL Things

It's easy to list the blessings in life: good health, family, a satisfying career, a comfortable home. We might even be thankful for things others take for granted such as freedom and clean drinking water, reliable transportation and enough food to eat. Then there are the little things, such as gardens, sunrises, pets and coffee.

But what about life's storms or unanswered prayers? Should we be thankful for these? Loss and hardship remind us of our dependence on God. He uses trials to draw us closer to him, to show us that He is our rock and refuge. In misfortune and grief, we discover God's comfort and strength. Should we not, then, be thankful for the storms, too?

Take Me to the River

God often works in unexpected ways. Just ask Naaman, the army commander in 2 Kings 5:1-14. Stricken with leprosy, he traveled to Israel seeking healing from the prophet Elisha. Instead of an impressive display or a grand ceremony, Elisha sent word for him to simply wash seven times in the Jordan River.

Naaman was not impressed. "Aren't the rivers of Damascus better than all the waters of Israel?" he asked. Why bathe in a foreign, muddy river when the clean, sparkling rivers of home were far more appealing? It didn't make sense. Yet what seemed absurd became the very path to his healing.

We may not be told to wade into an actual river, but we all face "Jordan moments" in life — times when God calls us to take a step that feels uncomfortable, humbling or completely illogical. It is in those moments that trust and obedience matter most.

Naaman's story reminds us that God's power is not limited by appearances or human reasoning. Sometimes the action that feels least likely to work is the one that opens the door to blessing. When God invites you to take the plunge, step into the water. You may find healing and hope waiting there.

Called to Be Saints

When Paul wrote to the church in Rome, he addressed his letter "To all God's beloved ... who are called to be saints" (Romans 1:7, NRSV). Paul regarded his fellow believers as people who have responded to the good news of Christ by choosing to follow and serve God.

The New Testament emphasizes that Christians are God's beloved — special people set apart to receive his grace and to be his witnesses. All people whose minds and hearts are devoted to God are "called to be saints."

Because of what God has done for us, all Christians can wear the label of saint.

Surpassing Grace

The word "surpass" means to exceed, to go beyond, to transcend the reach or capacity of. In his second letter to the church at Corinth, Paul refers to "the surpassing grace of God that he has given you" (II Corinthians 9:14, NRSV). Paul was reminding the Corinthians of the amazing, abundant grace God had showered upon them.

When Paul wrote that letter, the church in Jerusalem was suffering intense persecution. The members were poor and struggling to be faithful under dire circumstances.

Paul knew the church at Corinth was doing fine financially and that they had a mind to help out the Jerusalem church. He wrote: "You glorify God...by the generosity of your sharing with them and with all others, while they...pray for you because of the surpassing grace of God that he has given you" (II Corinthians 9:13-14, NRSV).

Consider how you can share God's surpassing grace with others in need.

The Gift of Work

The Bible affirms both the value and dignity of work. From the beginning, God placed Adam in the garden "to work it and keep it" (Genesis 2:15, ESV). In the fourth commandment, we are reminded not only to observe the Sabbath, but also to labor diligently throughout the week: "Six days you shall labor, and do all your work" (Exodus 20:9, ESV).

Work is more than a routine obligation; it is an opportunity to engage our God-given abilities in meaningful ways. Whether using our hands, minds, or hearts, we reflect the image of our Creator—bringing order, care, and creativity into the world.

Our labor allows us to contribute to the common good, find personal fulfillment, and practice faithful stewardship of the talents and strengths God has entrusted to us. As Paul writes, "We are God's fellow workers" (I Corinthians 3:9, ESV).

May we take time to recognize the blessing of work and celebrate those who serve, build, teach, lead, and labor with purpose and care.

The Power of Prayer Warriors

Prayer warriors are spiritual soldiers—men and women who faithfully lift others in prayer, often behind the scenes. Though their work may go unnoticed by the world, it is deeply valued by God. Their intercession can strengthen the weary, comfort the grieving, and open doors for God's will to be done.

In Scripture, we are urged to "pray one for another" (James 5:16), reminding us that healing and restoration often come through the prayers of the faithful. A prayer warrior stands in the gap, bringing needs before the Lord with boldness and persistence.

The Apostle Paul recognized the power of prayer, often asking others to pray for him as he shared the gospel. In the same way, prayer warriors today uphold churches, pastors, families, and communities.

Their prayers may be silent, but their impact is mighty. Never underestimate the difference a praying heart can make.

YOUR BIBLE QUESTIONS . . . ANSWERED

When a baby sins, is it because of his own sin or Adam's inherited sin?

"All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23).

This is kind of a loaded question, because a baby is obviously not born with a sinful record. If a baby in a Christian family dies, those parents will see that baby in the resurrection. But if the baby lives on, we know what happens. Every human is born with a sinful nature, and we all have sinful tendencies.

The Bible says, "All have sinned." Now this means committed sin. That baby, eventually, will understand the difference between right and wrong and likely will choose wrong at some point, because that's what our sinful nature leads us to do.

Some have also wondered what the age of accountability is, but the Bible is not specific on this subject. However, in the wilderness experience, those who didn't believe perished in the wilderness — and this included anybody that was 20 years or older. I don't believe you could fight in the army until you were 20 years of age. And in the Jewish culture, a boy is considered a man when he turns 12. He can go to the temple and participate in the services. So I would conclude that somewhere between 10 and 20, a young man or woman becomes accountable for sin.

People often wonder about Jesus' life as a baby He was born



with a clean record — and every baby on entrance into this world is sparkling clean as far as the record of sin. However, we are born selfish creatures. Jesus was born with the same potential to sin as you and I have. That's why the Bible says He was "tempted in all points even as we are." The only difference is this: He didn't sin. That's why He can be our High Priest and Advocate, He was not born as some kind of Superman immune to any kind of contamination. He wrestled with temptation, but He never gave in, giving us an example that if He could overcome by trusting the Father, we also can overcome by trusting Him.
